

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


chievement at Rose Hill!

PreK-1st utilizes AIMSweb to determine mastery of foundational reading and math skills, while 2nd-8th grade scholars take the Mastery Connect predictive benchmark assessments that are made to mimic the TCAP end of the year assessment. Hard work deserves a reward, so every scholar participated in the first Level Up Store recently! Scholars used points earned based on how they performed on the assessment to purchase prizes from the store. Additionally, each grade has a special prize incentive for reaching 100 100%'s on iReady, which is our intervention program designed to meet scholars where they are in reading and math.

Keep up the great work, scholars, and do your best on the winter benchmark fast approaching!

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
The 20 Book Challenge @ Rose Hill


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
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& Design Thinking

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

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We pledge to lend for the month of November to help our school save money, be more comfortable and protect the environment.

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


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build community partnerships!
